"The Unchartered Flight of Olivia West," by Sara Ackerman. It's 1927 and America's fascination with flight has just taken off. For Olivia "Livy" West is a young pilot with a yearning to see the world by plane. Upon learning of the 2,400-mile Dole Air Race Livy vows to do anything necessary to take part. But this is 1927 and it made clear to Livy that this is a men's only race. Instead, she will be a navigator for one of the pilots in the perilous race from California to Hawaii. Sixty years later, Wren, Livy's great-niece, inherits a spot Hawaiian property and with nothing on it but a ramshackle barn. Needing money, Wren plans to sell the place, but looking at the old planes gathering dust in the barn, Wren instead sets out to learn more about her great-aunt and her historic flight over the Pacific.

"Close to Death," by Anthony Horowitz. When Charles Kentworthy is found dead as a doornail on his doorstep, there is no dearth of suspects to choose from.
